





At DPETNS, we value the positive relationships between teachers and families and respectful communication is the key to maintaining these relationships.

- Each class teacher hosts an acquaintance meeting with parents/guardians in September/ October.
- From First Class onwards, the homework journal should be used as the primary source of communication with your child's teacher. A note in your child's journal should be used for matters relating to homework, notifications of early dismissal, appointments, a request for a meeting or any minor behavioural issues that you would like to make the teacher aware of. For more confidential issues, a separate note or letter can be sent in with your child.
- The school communicates with home principally through email but also through the noticeboard on the Aladdin schools app. Urgent messages (e.g. emergency school closures) will be sent by text. If you do not have access to email, please let us know and we will arrange for hard copies to be sent. The school website provides a good deal of information for parents www.dpetns.ie
- Please note that teachers are not in a position to check or respond to emails during teaching time and, therefore, for matters of urgency, you will need to phone the office. We ask you to also bear in mind that evenings and weekends are family time for us all and, as such, emails will generally not be responded to during this time.
- In the interest of positive home/school relations, we ask that all e-mails are checked for tone and content before pressing the 'send' button.

# The School Office

With almost five hundred students on roll, the school office is a very busy place. Unfortunately, we cannot always answer the telephone and respond to messages immediately. We ask for your patience and understanding when dealing with the school office. If you leave a message, we will ensure that it is responded to by the end of the school day (office closes at 2.45pm). Please contact the school office to change pick up arrangements in **emergency circumstances** only. We would ask you not to involve the office in children's social arrangements. There is also no need to call the school when your child is absent—all absences can be recorded through the Aladdin app. (see details of on next page).

We remind parents that it is essential that they sign in at the school office if they are entering the building at any stage between the hours of 9am and 2.30.

# Aladdin Schools

The school has been using the Aladdin Schools software service <u>www.aladdin.ie</u> since 2011 for administrative purposes. Last year we introduced parents to Aladdin Connect which gives you secure access to messages from the school, details of your child's attendance, test results, report cards etc. via a secure login from your Internet browser or Aladdin Connect App. All new parents/guardians will be issued with secure login details in September and it is important that you download this app as it is a fantastic way to enhance a school's communication with parents. It enables parents to stay connected and informed about their child's education by:

- Ensuring that the school has their most up to date contact information
- Keeping parents apprised of their child's attendance
- Keeping parents up to date on school and classroom news via noticeboard messages Allowing parents view their child's approved report card Giving parents the option to opt in to share contact information with their child's classmates' parents via the
- •
- Parent Privacy option for the class list.
- Allowing parents to view their child's latest standardised test results

Along with strengthening our home/school partnership, we also envisage Aladdin Connect helping the school by:

- Helping to improve attendance by allowing parents to keep track of any school days their child may have currently missed, along with late arrival and early leaving information.
- Helping to reduce the amount of class/school notes being sent home
- Helping the school/teachers communicate with parents when the need arises
- Reducing costs by eliminating the need to send school report cards by post
- Reducing costs by reducing the number of text messages that need to be sent

You can rest assured that Aladdin Schools uses state-of-the-art security to safeguard information entered by the school and data is stored and processed in strict compliance with Irish and European data protection laws. All families have by now received a text/email message containing your unique registration link. There is one link per parent which will allow the parent to access information for all their children in the school from one user account. Please do not forward this text/email or share this link as this is a unique registration code for each parent for your child/children in this school. During registration (new parents) you will choose a password that will be used in conjunction with your email address to securely access the Aladdin Connect going forward. If you choose you may share your own contact details with other parents of children in the same class as your children, but please be assured that this information will not be shared unless you choose to share it. Once you are registered you will be sent an email with a link to download the Aladdin Connect App to your mobile device. The main advantage of using the App is to receive immediate alerts for app messages sent by your school. Downloading the App is highly recommended to enhance both the parent and school's Connect experience.

By default both parents have access to view their child's contact information. If for any reason you do NOT wish to share your own personal contact information within the family circle or if you have any concerns regarding your particular family setup please contact the school in confidence to discuss or have this facility restricted.

It is both important and beneficial that all parents sign up for access to the Aladdin app.

# CHILD SAFEGUARDING

In March 2018 we ratified a new Child Safeguarding Policy in line with recent legislation and current best practice. The Board of Management recognises that child protection and welfare considerations permeate all aspects of school life and must be reflected in all of the school's policies, practices and activities. As a school we have adopted and will fully implement the Department's Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post Primary Schools.

In our school the Designated Liaison Person (DLP) is our Principal, Maeve Corish and the Deputy Designated Liaison Person is our Deputy Principal, Susan Clarke. Any child protection concerns relating to students in our school should be given in confidence to the DLP. The guiding principles of our Child Safeguarding Policy are:

- We recognise that the protection and welfare of children is of paramount importance, regardless of all other considerations.
- We will fully co-operate with the relevant statutory authorities in relation to child protection and welfare matters.
- We adopt safe practices to minimise the possibility of harm or accidents happening to children and protect staff from the necessity to take unnecessary risks that may leave themselves open to accusations of abuse or neglect.
- We develop a practice of openness with parents and encourage parental involvement in the education of their child/children.
- We fully respect confidentiality requirements in dealing with child protection matters. The school will also adhere to the above principles in relation to any adult or pupil with a special vulnerability.

We recognise that child safeguarding is the responsibility of all adults in our community and ask parents to co-operate fully with the policy by signing in at the school office when visiting the school for any reason and fully co-operating with requests from staff regarding Safeguarding Procedures.

We welcome feedback from parents on child safeguarding and are always open to suggestions or ideas that may improve our practices.




# OUR STUDENT COUNCIL

Our Learn Together programme is a key component of the Educate Together model. It's a curriculum that is living in our equality-based school and it seeks to offer students the opportunity to meaningfully and critically reflect upon the world around them. Ethical Education focuses on questions of equality, justice, sustainability and active citizenship. DPETNS teaches Ethical Education as an independent subject through the Learn Together curriculum. The four strands of the Learn Together Curriculum are:

Moral and Spiritual Equality and Justice Belief Systems Ethics and the Environment

A number of initiatives facilitate active learning of these strands including our democratically elected green schools and student council committees, peer mediation for conflict resolution, Playworks co-operative play, mindfulness, gardening and caring for our chickens, trips to various places of worship, assemblies and quest visitors.

DPETNS is proud to play a role in An Taisce's green school programme promoting long-term, whole-school



action for the environment, as part of our work on the Ethics and the Environment strand. We were proud to receive our most recent green flag for Global Citizenship Litter and Waste on the 22<sup>nd</sup> May 2019. We are all very proud of the work done by the green schools committee over the last two years which led to our success in earning our 6<sup>th</sup> green flag.

Our Green Schools committee is made up of two children from each class from 2<sup>nd</sup> to 6<sup>th</sup> as well as representatives from Sinéad and Lyndsy's ASD classes. These children put themselves forward as candidates through an election process held across the school each September. Green school committee members co-ordinate the emptying of the recycling bins each week, educating their peers so they can successfully reduce, re-use and recycle in an environmentally sustainable way. They give up some of their break-time to conduct energy audits daily. They also record the number of children walking, scooting or cycling to school on Wednesday's as part of the Walk on Wednesday Initiative.

# SAFETY ON THE SCHOOL GROUNDS



We ask parents/guardians to drive slowly and carefully when on the school grounds and surrounding area. A large number of our pupils walk to school unaccompanied. The children's safety is the responsibility of our entire school community.

- The drop off zone is not operating as well is it could. Please remember that this is a drop off/pick up zone only and there is no parking in this area at any time. The school gates are locked at 9am sharp and this space then reverts to children's play space. If you have a morning meeting in the school, please park off site and walk to the school; there is no parking for parents on site.
- The drop off zone is never open at Infant home time and there is no vehicle access to the school at 1:25pm unless there is a specific physical need (with a permit) which requires parking on the school grounds - this must be arranged in advance via the school office.

UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES SHOULD PEOPLE REVERSE INTO SPACES IN THE DROP OFF ZONE

- The drop off zone opens at 2.15. This area is play space for the children until then. Please do not arrive at the school before 2:15 and please do not start queuing on the Beaverstown Road while waiting for the gates to be opened. This causes serious hazards on the Beaverstown Road for other road users. We regularly take calls in the office complaining about the driving behaviour of our parents. If you arrive at the school before 2:20 we suggest that you have more than enough time to park safely in the DPCC and walk the short distance to the school.
- We now have cars parking on both sides of the new access road between here and Donabate Community College. This is causing serious issues with visibility for people using the crossing near the secondary school entrance. Children are having to step onto the road between parked cars in order to cross the road. This goes against everything we teach them about road safety.
- Please do not park on the footpaths in the vicinity of the school the footpaths around our school must be preserved as safe space for children travelling to and from school.
- Never park in the grounds of Donabate Community College.

We ask that all parents co-operate with us on the issue of keeping all 490+ of our students safe as they travel to and from school.

## Rules of the Drop Off:

- Drive to the furthest free space
- Do not leave excessive space between you and the car in front
- When the car in front moves on please move forward to make room for more cars
- Drivers must remain in their cars
- Children should never leave or enter the car on the roadside but should get in/out on the path side of the road.
- Drivers will only move out of the set down area when it is safe do to so and will use indicators in advance of moving.


Please ensure that childminders/grandparents/relatives are all made aware of the parking rules at the school

# PHOTOGRAPHS/IMAGES

# SAVING WITH THE CREDIT UNION-SERVICE OFFERED BY DPETNS

The school offers a service, every Thursday morning, where the children (from 1st class upwards) can lodge savings, big or small, into their credit union accounts. A parent volunteer comes in every week to facilitate this service and lodge the children's savings into the Credit Union. This is a great way of teaching your child the benefits of saving. This service has been operating in the school now for quite a number of years and some of our 'savers' have since moved onto Secondary School and College - we hope that they have held onto their good saving habits! If you wish to avail of this service, you will need to first of all set up the account and bring the following to the Credit Union office in Ballisk Court, Donabate (open Thursday, Friday and Saturday morning):

- Passport or Birth Certificate;
- PPS No. on an official document;

• Photo ID and proof of address for parent Your child will also need to be present to sign the membership application form. Once the account is set up, your child can bring in his/her credit union book to school on a Thursday morning and start saving. (Credit union books are then kept in a safe place in the school and given back to your child at the end of the school year or can be obtained on request).

The office will make an announcement at reception time and they can then bring their savings to the parent volunteer who is usually downstairs near the office.









# SPORT AT DPETNS

In DPETNS we value the importance of a wide range of sporting activities. We believe this variety provides children with the opportunity to enjoy physical activity as an ongoing part of a healthy lifestyle.

Apart from our teachers engaging with the Physical Education curriculum, we welcome a number of visiting coaches. Staff also volunteer to run activities after school. These activities include GAA, hockey, tennis, table tennis, hurling, athletics, aerobics, soccer, cricket, basketball and many more.



# FUN ON YARD AT DPETNS


Children enjoy a range of fun activities at yard time. These activities are both tagged yard activities or part of our Playworks programme. Tagged activities include football, dodgeball, table tennis and basketball.

Playworks is a programme organised by Sixth Class children for senior classes and Third Class children for junior classes (supervised by adults) and they co-ordinate games on yard, ensuring that every child who wants to participate, is included. We have spent the last two years reviewing our Homework Policy. The views of parents, teachers and students were all sought in an effort to develop a new policy suitable for the 21st century. Our new policy was ratified in May 2019 and will be implemented on a pilot basis for the 2019/2020 school year.

The main changes to the policy are as follows:

- Generally written homework will be assigned on Mondays to be completed by Thursday or Friday. This will allow increased flexibility for families.
- Spellings, reading and tables should be practised every day from Monday to Thursday.
- No written homework will be assigned during the months of September and assigned and children will be encouraged to take exercise and play games.
- assigned in a year.

# General guidelines on the time that should be spent on homework:

- Friday.
- $\Rightarrow$  First/Second: 20-30 minutes
- $\Rightarrow$  Third/Fourth: 30-40 minutes
- $\Rightarrow$  Fifth/Sixth: 40-60 minutes

We stress that these guidelines above are the absolute maximum a child should spend on homework. If homework is regularly a stressful experience between parent and child, you should contact the class teacher.



# HOMEWORK AT DEPTNS

# BUDDY SYSTEM

We encourage the children from different classes and different levels to play together and to look out for each other. We see this inter-class communication as playing an important part in maintaining our inclusive school.

To strengthen inter-class communication, we 'buddy' every class in the school with another class in September each year. This Buddy System encourages the older children in the school to look out for the younger children, to get to know them and to support them. The older children are given opportunities to be leaders and to model good and responsible behaviour.

All of the children benefit from the Buddy System and they enjoy spending time with their buddies. Sometimes the buddy classes will do curricular activities together (e.g. Art, Science or Reading), sometimes they just enjoy social time together. At whole school assemblies, the Junior Infants often sit beside their Sixth class buddies which helps them to relax and enjoy the assembly better.



# CONFLICT RESOLUTION - S.A.L.T and PEER MEDIATION

Conflict is part of life and, in this regard, DPETNS is no different from other schools. Children will have rows and arguments and sometimes they find these conflicts very upsetting. We believe that every child needs to learn conflict resolution skills and we teach the SALT programme in Senior Infants and First Class. SALT teaches the children to view conflict as a learning opportunity and discreetly teaches them the importance of being able to negotiate. The children are taught the importance of using SALT (Stop, Ask, Listen, Talk) when they find themselves in a situation of conflict. We encourage the children to solve conflicts for themselves and we work to develop their skills in negotiating conflict. Throughout the school the children are encouraged to use the four steps of the SALT programme. Naturally there are times when a situation requires adult intervention and the children are encouraged to talk to their teachers if something is bothering them.

To support our conflict resolution programme, the children in Sixth Class each year are trained to be Peer Mediators. The Peer Mediation programme is highly valued by our students as it enhances the voice of children in the school. When an issue of conflict arises, two Sixth Class mediators sit with two younger children to sort out the row or argument without adults getting involved. It can be very effective in encouraging children to listen to each other and to reflect on how their behaviour may be impacting on another person. The Peer Mediation programme has been running now for six years. It teaches the children conflict resolution skills that we hope will serve them well throughout their lives.

For the past few years we have been working hard to promote positive mental health and wellbeing in the school. Minding our mental health is a complex business and there is no magic wand available for protecting our mental health. Every year we celebrate positive mental health in the month of January and in all classes throughout the school this topic is explored in an age appropriate manner. The SPHE (Social, Personal and Health Education) curriculum is taught in all classes for one half hour a week. The encouragement of growth (rather than fixed) mindsets are nurtured throughout the school. In addition to this we have undertaken a number of other initiatives to support positive mental health:

- Every morning we have a one minute reflective pause where the children in all classes stop and reflect. During this moment's silence the children are encouraged to breathe deeply, practise mindfulness, say a prayer or simply stop being busy for a moment. The children are free to choose how they spend the moment in keeping with their own needs and beliefs.
- The Roots of Empathy programme is taught in 2<sup>nd</sup> class every year. This is a programme where a mother and new baby visit the class over the course of the year and the baby teaches the children all about empathy. This is a very popular programme and research has shown it to be highly effective in nurturing empathy in the children.
- In 1st and 4<sup>th</sup> class the children are offered a ten week Mindfulness workshop.
- The Weaving Wellbeing Programme is taught in 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> classes. This is a positive psychology programme that teaches the children all about identifying character strengths, positive emotions, resilience and positive relationships.

We hope that these initiatives will help enhance positive mental health, resilience and well-being in all our students and that, by the time they leave DPETNS, they will have the language and the skills they will need to cope with the ups and downs of life.

# OUR PARTNERSHIP WITH PEPY EMPOWERING YOUTH

DPETNS community has been part of an innovative educational partnership with PEPY Empowering Youth since October 2013. The focus of this partnership is to enhance global identity, a sense of social justice and cultural awareness in our student body, through meaningful connections with another Changemaker organisation, based in Cambodia.

The workings of our partnership enhance the teaching and learning of our Learn Together programme and provides opportunities for all students to play an active role in global development and nurture a real understanding of the Sustainable Development Goals and global citizenship in general.

Our school community has raised over €50,000 over the years for PEPY and this has primarily supported scholarships for Cambodian students to third level education.

Through this partnership our students learn all about life in a developing country and the importance of being a global citizen. Equality and justice issues are explored in depth. Last year we launched our Scholarship Sponsorship Programme and lots of our families are now donating to PEPY on a monthly basis to support the education of young Cambodians. Since 2014 a group of Irish teachers from the partner schools has spent three weeks each summer sharing their skills with PEPY and learning so much when there. Our visitors always stay with host families in our community.

# OUR CLASSES FOR CHILDREN WITH AUTISM

DPETNS is an autism friendly school. In addition to having two classes specifically catering for children with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), we also have a large number of children with ASD in our mainstream classes. In DPETNS, autism is everybody's business - we strive to create an inclusive school where no child is an outsider. Our students are taught that people learn differently and some children need extra support to help them to learn. Thanks to the incredible support of our school community we have been able to provide great facilities for our students, including a fully equipped sensory garden/playground, a lights room and a multisensory room.





# The Support Team in DPETNS

In DPETNS, we actively promote inclusion of all children and strive to ensure that every child has the opportunity to reach their true potential. The Special Education Team comprises of fourteen Support Teachers and eleven Special Needs Assistants.

The Support teacher's role is to work with the class teachers to ensure that children are able to access the curriculum within the mainstream classrooms in our school. This involves providing additional support to children who have been identified by external agencies (psychologists, therapists etc.) as needing support in areas such as literacy, numeracy, social skills, emotional, behavioural skills, motor skills, life skills and speech and language skills. At times, it may be the class team (mainstream teacher, core support teacher and support co-ordinator) who decide that your child will need scaffolding /support. Interventions may be given on a temporary or long term basis. In this case, we will communicate this to parents and involve you in the process. We use the Continuum of Support model (below) to assess how much support your child will need and children are placed on the continuum in accordance with their learning needs. Most of the support happens within the classroom setting. Sometimes it may be provided in a group setting or a one to one setting.



The SNA (Special Needs Assistant) team provides support to children who have been assessed as having care needs by the Department of Education. This support is provided in a very discreet way and our SNA team work to promote independence in children. Some of our SNAs may provide care to more than one child at a time. Together, the Support Teachers, the SNA team and the parents, work in partnership to ensure that 'no child is an outsider' in DPETNS. # PUNCTUALITY/ATTENDANCE

Being on time is an important life skill. Lateness has a detrimental effect on a child's learning and wellbeing, it also disrupts the other students in a class and wastes teaching/learning time. We are now recording lateness on our computerised roll system and this enables us to track punctuality and attendance on a child's record. We ask parents to please make every effort to have their children in their lines by 8.45am at the latest and to encourage them to walk into school independently.

Our attendance levels have deteriorated over past few years and this can be partly attributed to parents taking children out of school for holidays in term time We request that parents do not take their children out of school during term time. There are approximately fifteen weeks holidays built into the primary school calendar and we request that parents schedule family holidays during these breaks rather than in term time. If children miss standardised tests, we cannot guarantee that we can accommodate them for testing at a later date.

If, in exceptional circumstances, you have to take your child(ren) out of school during term time, please speak to Maeve.

Teachers will not schedule additional work for children who are on holidays.



# ANNUAL SCHOOL LEVY


The annual school levy is €60 per child. The school relies heavily on this money to fully equip classrooms. For families of three or more (attending the school) the fee will reduce to €50 per child. If you have difficulty paying this levy please talk to Maeve, in strictest confidence.

Payments can be made through our online e-payment system. Our school uses the Aladdin software service for administrative purposes and the ePayment system will give you access from an internet browser on your computer, phone or tablet to make secure payments to the school using your credit or debit card. In September you will receive an email message containing your payment access link. This will bring you to a parent payment page which will contain all payments requested for all siblings in a family. There is only one link per family ensuring you have the option to pay all amounts due for all your children in one transaction. Payments can be also be made by cash or cheque to your child's teacher in an envelope, clearly marked

The Book Rental Scheme (BRS) is available to children in 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th class. It was introduced in 2014 to help parents significantly reduce the cost of their booklist bill. Last year the take up was 100% and the feedback was very positive.

For €25 per child, books are sourced, covered, catalogued and placed in the classroom, ready for use in September.

For children in **2nd class** the BRS supplies their English Dictionary, Atlas, History, Geography and Science books free of charge. Parents in this year still need to purchase their own textbooks, so their children can continue to write in their books.

From 3rd - 6th, the BRS books are the property of the school and there is no writing in these books. We would like to thank the children for their continuing good upkeep of these books so that they can be used from year to year. # **Mission Statement**


DPETNS aims, through this policy, to help our whole school community, children, staff and parents, develop positive and responsible attitudes to food and nutrition and to appreciate the benefits that healthy food habits make to overall physical and mental health and wellbeing.

# Rationale and Aims

At DPETNS we recognise the importance of a healthy lifestyle and diet. The main objective of this policy is, in conjunction with the curriculum subjects SPHE (Social, Personal and Health Education), Science and the Learn Together Programme, to promote nutritional awareness and positively affect food and drink choices within our school community. In order to provide a clear message and also to give information and support to parents, children and staff, we have developed two documents; this policy document and a supporting document with lunchtime ideas and extra nutritional information. Both documents have been developed in consultation with the children, parents and staff of the school and have been approved by the PTA and the Board of Management.

# Healthy Eating in DPETNS

The revised food pyramid has been used in developing this policy and is a key tool in communicating healthy food messages. The Food Pyramid encourages us to avoid foods high in fat, salt and sugar and to eat more fruit and vegetables. It also provides a guide to correct portion size. - It is very important for children's energy and concentration levels that they eat a healthy breakfast before coming to school.
- Children will normally have two breaks for food during the school day, at 10.20 and again at 12.25.
- A healthy lunchbox includes a piece of food from each of the bottom four shelves of the Food Pyramid; Bread/pasta/rice - wholemeal and wholegrain varieties are best Milk/cheese/yoghurt

Meat/fish/eggs - choose lean meat and limit processed, salty meats. Choose oily fish like salmon. • Children may bring a small item from the top shelf of the Food Pyramid to school on Fridays or on special occasions as agreed by the Principal and school staff. However the following foods are not considered healthy options and the following foods should not be included on a daily basis in your child's

lunchbox:

Crisps; Sweets; Biscuits; Cereal Bars; Cake; Muffins; Pastries; Croissants; Sausage Rolls; Lollipops; Fruit Winders; Jam; Chocolate and Chocolate Products; Mousses; Fizzy Drinks; Chocolate covered Rice Cakes A number of our students and staff have severe nut allergies We ask that nobody brings nuts or nut products to school.

# Chewing gum is banned from the school premises

- Staff will support the Healthy Eating Policy and will not offer food to children as rewards or prizes.
- In the interest of fairness and for allergy and religious as well as health reasons, cakes, buns, sweets, chocolate or other treats sent to school for birthday celebrations will not be distributed.
- Parents of children with specific dietary requirements and/or food allergies should speak directly to their child's class teacher.
- In support of our Green School initiatives we encourage reusable food and drink containers and all waste materials are brought home.

# Suitable drinks for children:

- Drinks should always be included in a packed lunch. Extra water should be included on PE days and in warmer weather.
- Water and milk are the most suitable drinks for children. Children are encouraged to drink water throughout the school day.
- Unsweetened fruit juices and smoothies, "tooth kind" drinks, yoghurt drinks and diluted squashes are allowed at lunch times.

# **Education measures**

- All children will receive lessons on healthy eating through SPHE, Science and the Learn Together Programme.
- Parents/Guardians of incoming Junior Infants and new children to the school will be informed about the Healthy Eating Policy.
- Staff will remind parents/guardians of the policy at Acquaintance Meetings and as needed throughout the year.

# **Review and Evaluation**

- This policy revises the previous Healthy Eating Policy which was originally ratified in 2008.
- Interviews with children, staff and parent surveys and HSE and Department of Education recommendations were taken into account when reviewing the policy.
- For this policy to be successful it needs to be supported by the whole school community. We appreciate that encouraging children to choose certain foods is not always easy. However, with the increase in obesity, type 2 diabetes and the prevalence of dental cavities in children, we are encouraging best practise when in school.
- This policy will be reviewed in 2020.

Fruit/salad/vegetables - enjoy a variety of colours and limit fruit juice to unsweetened once a day.



# BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Our school is governed by the Board of Management of the school. This democratically elected committee of eight people has the responsibility to ensure that our school is run effectively, in keeping with the four main principles of EducateTogether: child-centered, co-educational, democratically run and equality based.

The Board of Management is the decision making body in the school. Each Board of Management serves a four year term and our current Board began it's term of office in November 2015.

# MEMBERSHIP

PTA membership is open to all parents/guardians of children enrolled in our school and to all teaching staff, We welcome male and female representation. We meet a few times during the year. Our AGM will take place on Thursday, 19th September. 2019, at which new members are signed up and PTA committee members are elected—all are very welcome.

# WHAT WE DO

We run a number of events throughout the school year and support the school in any events that it may be holding. We also help to review school policies and are affiliated with the National Parents Council. Our activities include:

- organising coffee mornings to support parents getting to know one another (e.g. on Junior Infants' first day)
- organising the refreshments for 5th Class Grandparents' Day
- organising evening talks for parents on areas of interest
- assisting with Sports Day and Fun runs.

We are affiliated with the National Parents Council. We also help to review school policies and the PTA supports the school in promoting positive mental health. Recently, the entire parent body expressed their views on their children's use of Smartphones. This review was carried out following challenges in senior classes around children accessing inappropriate content on their smartphones.

- Swimming






A full schedule of classes and term dates will be available in September. Registration will take place on Saturday, 13th September. The ECA are also always happy to have new volunteers!
