

- We aim to provide a learning environment that encourages and promotes the holistic development of each and every child attending our school, allowing them to give of their best and be their best.





Literacy


- Children are taught to read using phonics.
- The children are taught the letter sounds. The focus is on the sounds the letters make and not the letter names.
- Using a multi-sensory approach
- When reading is introduced, it is taught using a 'blending' technique, where children are taught to 'blend' sounds together. For example, c-a-t, b-a-g.
- Words that cannot be sounded out (also known as 'heart words', such as 'the', 'my', 'he' and 'she'), are given to the children to learn by sight.



Cursive Writing



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We use cursive handwriting in our school.

Gaeilge

Based around ten themes which are visited and revisited each year in Primary School

(Sa Bhaile, Me Fein, An Scoil, Siopadoireacht, Ocaidi Speisialta, Caitheamh Aimsire, An Aimsir, Bia, Teilifis, Eadai)

Visual and interactive learning based on the themes using a programme on the interactive board with games, songs, poems, vocabulary and short animated stories.

Maths

▶ In Junior Infants, the children will learn to read, write and add with the numbers 0-5.

- Other strands on the curriculum include:

- Measures (such as capacity, length and weight)
- Patterns
- Sorting Objects
- Numeracy Games (on interactive whiteboard)

Settling In


- School starts at 8.45am and finishes at 1.25pm
